VERNET-LES-BAINS: RUDYARD KIPLING, the ENTENTE CORDIALE MONUMENT, and the ANGLICAN CHURCH



Rudyard Kipling stayed in Vernet-les-Bains in 1910, 1911, 1914 and 1926. By 1910, he was already well-known in France, following the award to him of the Nobel Prize for Literature and the success of the French version of *The Jungle Book*.
